The Importance of Being Self-Sufficient

PHILADELPHIA, Pa. – After an emergency happens resources can be strained quickly and you may have to do without electricity, water service, telephone service, and access to a grocery store just to name a few. That's why it's so important for everyone to have the ability to be self-sufficient after an emergency occurs.

"One of the best ways people can help their community and first responders is to be self-sufficient after a disaster," said Regional Administrator MaryAnn Tierney, "by being self-sufficient, people can take a lot of pressure and strain off of vital resources. Additionally, resources may not be able to reach you for a variety of reasons so you should be prepared by having important items already on hand."


One of the easiest ways to be self-sufficient is to build an emergency supply kit. These kits are simply a collection of basic items your household may need in the event of an emergency. You should assemble your kit well in advance of an emergency because you may not have time to search for the supplies you need or shop for them. Keeping your kit organized in some sort of container also ensures that if you have to evacuate you can quickly take your kit with you.

There are a number of basic items that should go into your kit that you probably already have around the house, like water, food, a flashlight, a first aid kit, a can opener, and a radio. There are other items that you may not have thought of or may not have at home, like dust masks, moist towelettes, garbage bags, or a sleeping bag. Don't forget to take into account the needs of everyone, that thinking of things like diapers, formula, medications, contact lenses and supplies, special food, or coloring books or activities for kids. You can get a full listing of what should go in your emergency kit and how you can maintain it at ready.gov/build-a-kit.

While building your emergency supply kit can seem like a daunting task, it doesn't have to be. When you go out to the store, see what's on sale that you need and pick up a few things at a time, that way you don't break the bank. Another tip is rather than buying bottled water; you can disinfect empty 2-liter bottles and fill them with water. Can't think of what you want for a birthday or holiday; why not suggest people buy you preparedness supplies, that way you get something you'll actually use.

E-WASTE LAW CHANGES THE WAY WE GET RID OF OLD ELECTONICS

As of January 24th, Pennsylvania joined about 20 other states with a disposal ban on desktop computers, laptop computers, computer monitors, printers, keyboards, mice, tablets, ipads, kindles and televisions and anything with a four inch screen in state landfills.

E-Waste counts for about 70 percent of the toxic materials in landfills. A Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection spokesperson said "The issue is the heavy metals like lead, cadmium and mercury that seep out of computers and TVs and into the ground." According to sustainability specialists, computers contain toxic materials including lead which is a neurotoxin that also harms the kidneys and reproductive system, even low level lead exposure can impair a child's mental development. PVC produces highly toxic dioxins when incinerated. Retardants are a group of compounds that may cause thyroid damage and harm fetal development. Chromium can cause holes in the nasal septum and ingesting large amounts could cause kidney/liver damage, even death. Long term exposure to cadmium damages kidneys and bones. Beryllium is a carcinogen that causes lung disease. Mercury has been linked to brain and kidney damage. These toxins do not decompose ever.

Curbside trash collectors are not permitted to pick up these items. If an individual is caught illegally dumping such e-waste, the CDRA (Covered Device Recycling Act) provides for fines up to \$1,000 for the first offense and up to \$2,000 for subsequent violations.

Goodwill of Southwestern Pennsylvania recently announced that they will no longer accept any television donations. Since the new E-Waste legislation, they received about 20,000 TVs in 2013, exceeding the 1.5 million pounds their recycler allows them this year. The number of TVs that are able to be resold is very low. However, Goodwill will continue to accept computer donations in a partnership with Dell Reconnect.

Under the CDRA, electronics manufacturers bear the biggest responsibility for e-waste recycling and face the biggest penalties for not complying. They are supposed to establish and manage a plan to collect, transport and recycle e-waste. The DEP suggests that consumers contact the retailers where they purchase their new electronics, to see if they will recycle their old items. In addition, there are electronic recyclers out there such as eLoop and Construction Junction. Earth911.com is an excellent resource to find recycling centers in our area. The DEP also suggests reduce the need to purchase a replacement computer by buying one with ample capacity for upgrades or reuse by selling it or donating it. ■

Please note that we ARE NOT requesting a key to your home. We are providing you with an opportunity to give us information that we will keep on file in the Police Department. In the event of an emergency, the officer on-duty would contact the individual listed on the card so that access can be granted to the home. As always, we regularly trained and drilled to maintain and improve our skills in firefighting and rescue work.

We participated in various community-focused activities. We had two booths at the Wilkins Summer Festival offering games of chance and "walking tacos". On June 22, we provided security and safety for the 5K race. Also, we had planned to relate to kids by bringing our engine to the Emmanuel Lutheran Church Bible Camp and "Kids' Day at Applebee's," but unfortunately these events were cancelled due to rain.

The chassis is ready for our much-needed, new rescue vehicle. The box is still in production. The new rescue will be compliant with current national standards.



Composting Workshop

On Thursday, October 10, 2013 Wilkins Township will host the Pennsylvania Resources Council for a Backyard Composting Workshop, from 7 PM to 8:30 PM in the Wilkins Township Community Center.

Composting is nature's way of recycling. By utilizing the natural process of decomposition, organic materials often "waste," such as grass clippings, food scraps, autumn leaves and even paper, can be recycled back into a rich soil conditioner. Through this transition, soil organisms, many of which are too small to see, break down the organic material in a compost pile so that valuable plant nutrients can be released for future generations of plants to use. Composting helps you reduce your waste stream, it improves the health of your gardens, and most of all its easy to do and enjoyable.

This workshop thoroughly covers the importance of composting, setting up a compost pile, proper maintenance and ways of using finished compost. Participants will receive an Earth Machine Compost Bin with attendance. This bin, approved across the state as an ideal bin for urban and suburban areas, has an eighty-gallon capacity.

The cost of the class is:

\$55 per couple for the class and one composting bin
