WHAT'S GOING ON?

Lions Park Renovation

Lions Park remains closed as work continues on the renovation project. Improvements will include the construction of a dek hockey court, new parking arrangements, preliminary construction for a future spray park and new playground, stormwater retention features and handicapped accessible sidewalks. New fencing, benches and trash receptacles will also be installed. This project is funded through grants received from Pennsylvania's Greenways, Trails and Recreation Programs Grant (\$318,000), Wilkins Township Industrial Development Authority (\$91,000) and General Fund reserves (\$76,900).

PUBLIC WORKS NOTES



Yard Waste Dropoff

During the month of October there will be a Yard Waste drop off container behind the Public Works Garage at the Municipal Building. Residents can bring and dispose of yard waste materials as follows.

Acceptable Items

- Garden and Plant Debris
- Leaves
- Shrubs
- Tree Limbs Diameter of 4" or less

Non-Acceptable Items

- Grass Clippings
- Logs
- Whole Trees
- Building Materials of any Type

Rules & Restrictions

- No Plastic Bags
- Paper Recycling Bags are OK
- Remove Dirt from Root Balls

Leaf Collection

The 2019 Leaf Collection Program is scheduled to begin on October 28. A complete schedule is included in this newsletter. So that we may stay on schedule we ask that residents place leaves out the day prior to your scheduled pick up day and place the leaves in rows along the curb line of the street and not large piles. Please remove branches, sticks, grass and animal waste from leaves because they clog the machines and cause down time for the workers.

Linhart Park Compost Site

The Compost Facility is maintained by the Township and is located behind the ball field at Linhart Park. There is a large pile of composted leaves from last year which is very nice material and is available free of charge. Please note that this is limited to residents' use at their homes only and is not available to contractors and landscapers for commercial use or resale.

Grass Clipping Composting

Again this year there is a posted area at the Township Leaf Compost Site at Linhart Park that residents can drop off grass clippings and mix with equal parts of leaf compost (a shovel is provided). We would also ask that residents who do not bag their grass please do not blow the grass onto the street. This helps us keep our streets and catch basins clean and keeps unwanted pollutants out of our streams and rivers.

Sewer Cleaning and Inspection

Although the bulk of the sewer cleaning and video inspecting is finished, Township Workers will be around doing maintenance, follow up inspections and repairs as needed. Workers do carry identification and are required to show it if asked. During the course of the sewer work we are still finding manholes in yards that have been covered over by property owners. This practice is not permitted. You should be aware that when these are found they will be

uncovered and/or raised to the existing grade. **Should someone want to enter your home using the pretext of working for the Township, you should notify 911 immediately.**

We are finding a number of sanitary sewer problems due to the use of sanitary wipes. These products do not break down in the sewer system and they can and do cause blockages and backups in your sewer lines, the township main lines as well as the wastewater treatment plant. Please dispose of these items in a waste can and do not flush in the toilet.

Snow Removal

Winter will be upon us soon and there are some things that residents can do to help during snow storms: Yield to salt and plow trucks especially on hills. If you come upon a truck starting up or down a steep hill, wait and let it pass. Please refrain from parking in Cul-de-sac's. Do not park vehicles on sides of streets that are posted "No Parking", it makes maneuvering our trucks extremely difficult. Please maintain trees and bushes that overhang onto the street. This will help us to plow your street safely and doesn't do damage to the plow truck. If you have free standing basketball hoops that are either on or hanging over the street please move them back off the street.

Remember we are here to make your streets safe.

FIRE RESCUE NEWS

#1 Volunteer Fire Company

More Than a Fire Company

As our name indicates, our primary responsibility is to provide fire protection services to the homes and businesses in our community. Hundreds of training hours are spent each year preparing for such an event. But that is only part of the services we provide. This past year we have responded to over 150 vehicle related incidents such as car fires, fuel spills, and accidents, sometimes involving entrapment of the driver and/or passengers. In fact, we have a truck designed and outfitted with specialized rescue tools to handle these types of emergencies and many of our firefighters have received extensive training in their usage. Excessive rain in our area results in over two dozen calls annually for us to assist residents experiencing flooding in their home or rescuing a person trapped by rising water. And yes, we even occasionally get called for pet rescue situations. All of these services are provided by the men and woman, volunteers all, who give of their time and talents to ensure these services are available when needed.

Fire Prevention Week is October 6 – 12

Here are some tips from the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) on planning an escape from your home in case of an emergency:

- **Map it out** – there should be two exits from every room (a door and a window) and then map a path to outside
- **Make a meeting place** – pick a meeting place outside in front of your home
- **911** – make sure everyone knows how to call 911 from a mobile phone or neighbor's phone once they are safely outside
- **Smoke alarms** – you should have at least one on every level, in each bedroom, and near the sleeping areas
- **Carbon monoxide detectors** – should be located in the basement and in the hallway near bedrooms

For 2018, Wilkins #4 fire company had 194 calls, our highest amount of calls ever. As of mid-August 2019, we have had 133 calls.

Wilkins #4 (Eastmont) and Wilkins #1 (Railroad St.) are in the process of legally merging. This means that there will be two fire companies in the township, Wilkins #1 and Wilkins #3 (Powell Street). Wilkins #4 would like to thank those who have supported us over the past 65+ years of our existence. The biggest reason for this merger is that volunteerism throughout Pennsylvania is dwindling at alarming rates. This has hit us hard, not being able to recruit and retain our volunteer membership. Our many pleas for new members have not worked in our favor. We have some of the best equipment, gear and trucks, but without the volunteers to respond to emergencies, we are not able to survive. Please support us throughout this process and keep supporting the two remaining fire companies in the future.

Winter reminder: please keep fire hydrants by your home free of decorations, debris and snow. Please don't plant bushes that might impede our access to a hydrant. We need hydrants for our use and your protection. Also, please make sure that your house number is clearly visible from the street in order to make it easier for us to locate when responding to calls.

Always remember to keep the batteries in your smoke and carbon monoxide detectors current by replacing them twice a year, every time we change our clocks. These detectors can save lives!

Woodland Hills School District News

Profile: Ms. Jamie L. Glasser School Board President

Ms. Jamie Glasser has lived in the Woodland Hills School District her entire life. "It's home and it feels like it," she says. "I'm a 1997 grad, and both of my siblings graduated from Woodland Hills as well. My parents and all of my aunts and uncles graduated from Churchill Area before Woodland Hills was formed. One of my grandmothers graduated from Scott High," Glasser adds.

Glasser was appointed to the board in November 2014, and elected as board president by her colleagues in August 2017. She says she applied to fill a vacancy, and because there were big issues facing the district and our communities.

She says the district's strength is its students. "They are eager, committed and incredibly bright," she says. She also adds, "We have amazing, committed, caring teachers, administrators and staff."

Glasser wants residents to know that, "Our curriculum is second to none, and we're working hard to improve facilities so that students have the very best environments for learning."

And, the one thing that she thinks people may be surprised to know about the district, Glasser says, is that, "For our kids,

diversity really is our strength. It is really beautiful to watch them interact, and we should follow their model."

Glasser says she's seen a lot of changes in the district in the past year. She says, "I think the district, as a whole, is more forward-thinking, and that's important."

Going forward, she wants to see enrollment increase at Woodland Hills. "I think we have great families who are talking about all the good that is happening, and that word of mouth is powerful," she says.

"We can and should always do more to invite people in, welcome them and have a conversation," adds Glasser. She wants everyone in the district to know that they can come to her with any questions or concerns about district policy or any issue that might arise.

She is also a Rotarian with the Forest Hills Rotary Club, and the stage manager at Woodland Hills for the Spring Musical and the Jr. High Musical. "I also coach Mock Trial at the High School, which is my very favorite thing," she says.


