In April through August, our company responded to 40 emergency calls, including calls for structure, vehicle, and vegetation (brush) fires and rescue calls. We also responded to hazardous condition calls and other incidents. Furthermore, we participated regularly in training and drills to maintain and improve our skills in firefighting and rescue work.



Our most recent residential fund drive is ongoing. Thank you to those who've contributed. If you haven't given yet, please do so.

In order to raise funds, we operated two booths at the Summer Festival where we sold strip tickets and had a wheel of fortune game. *Thank you for your support.*

On June 23 we assisted with safety issues during the Summer Festival 5K Run/Walk, such as blocking off intersections and directing traffic.

How to Prevent Storm water Runoff Pollution



Use fertilizers sparingly and sweep up driveways, sidewalks and gutters. Never dump anything down storm drains or in streams. Compost your yard waste. Use least toxic pesticides, follow labels and learn how to prevent pest problems. Direct downspouts away from paved surfaces; consider a rain garden to capture runoff. Take your car to the carwash instead of washing it in your driveway. Check your car for leaks and recycle motor oil. Pick up after your pet. ■

OASIS Tutoring Volunteers Needed!



The OASIS Intergenerational Tutoring Program promotes literacy with a proven approach that helps high-need children build skills to read at grade level. Older adults (50 years and older) are our volunteer tutors. The Pittsburgh OASIS tutoring program is 11 years old and works in both the Pittsburgh Public School District and the Woodland Hills School District. The curriculum is a six-step approach to literacy developed by educators. It includes reading and language activities that spark a child's interest and create an environment where students can achieve. Tutors receive twelve hours of training in the six-step approach before they begin working with students. Free materials are provided to the tutors to use. OASIS also provides ongoing support with additional training mentoring and networking opportunities throughout the school year. The eat-in-only event will be held from 3 until 6 PM. A \$5 donation is requested. ■

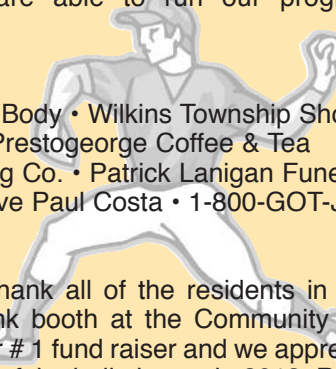

As our population grows older, our police officers are frequently asked by the loved ones or neighbors of our older residents to provide well-being checkups. By providing the department with the name and phone number of a key-holder, the police officers could better serve these types of requests.

Please note that we ARE NOT requesting a key to your home. We are providing you with an opportunity to give us information that we will keep on file in the Police Department. In the event of an emergency, the officer on-duty would contact the individual listed on the card so that access can be granted to the home. 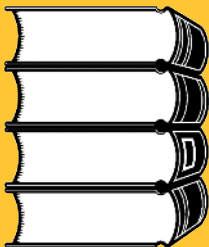

KEEPING SKUNKS AWAY

Several areas within the Municipality are having problems with skunks. The Township does not trap or dispose of any wildlife. It is up to the resident(s) to contact an exterminator or a company that traps skunks if they so wish. The website www.howtogetridofstuff.com gives several useful tips on trying to get rid of skunks. Below are a few examples from the website:

Keeping skunks away... far away

Skunks are scavengers and will eat anything from bugs to garbage. If a skunk finds a tasty morsel on your land, chances are good that he'll start visiting more often. Skunks are nocturnal, so you're most likely to see/smell them at night and in the early morning when they're out scavenging for food. Skunks can and do eat anything; bird eggs, bugs and larvae, human wastes, small rodents, you name it - they'll eat it. Following is a list of the most common foods that attract skunks onto people's property:

Unprotected garbage. When you transfer your trash outside for pickup, store it in heavy duty metal or plastic trash cans with lids that will stay on even if the can is knocked over. Never place unprotected bags out on the curb.

Grubs and larvae: Skunks love grubs! Grubs are beetle larva that live underneath of your lawn. Skunks are known for digging small holes in peoples yards as they hunt for them. Luckily, beneficial nematodes also love to eat grubs, and are easily deployed in your lawn and garden to eliminate this attractant.

Pet food: Never leave unprotected animal food outside at night, it's akin to setting a place at your dinner table for Pepé le Pew.

Nuts, berries, and fruits. If you have bushes or trees that bear fruits, nuts, or berries you should periodically walk your yard and remove any that have fallen to the ground. Skunks will happily feast on them, and so will rodents... which skunks will also happily eat.

Other attractants. While the above food sources are the most common culprits that attract skunks, there are (of course) more. If any of these exist on your property, do your best to minimize or eliminate them.

- Compost heaps containing bones, fruit rinds and egg shells.
- Large numbers of ground dwelling insects under dead leaves and foliage.
- Easily accessible water sources.
- Bird feeder spills.

Public Works Notes Fall 2012

The 2012 Leaf Collection Program is scheduled to begin on October 15th. A complete Schedule is included in this issue of the newsletter. We ask that residents place leaves in rows along the curb line of the street and not large piles. Please remove branches and sticks from leaves because they clog the machines and cause down time for the workers.

The Compost facility is maintained by the Township and is located behind the ball field at Linhart Park. There is a large pile of composted leaves from last year. It is very nice material and you are free to use it at no charge. Please note that this is limited to resident's use at their homes only and is not available to contractors and landscapers for commercial use or resale.

Winter will be upon us soon and there are some things that residents can do to help during snow storms: Yield to salt and plow trucks especially on hills. If you come upon a truck starting up or down a steep hill, wait and let it pass. Remember they are there to make your streets safe. If you have free standing basket ball hoops that are either on or hanging over the street please move them back off the street.

Although the bulk of our sanitary sewer cleaning and video inspecting is complete, township workers will still be around doing follow up inspections and maintenance. They do carry identification and are required to show it if asked. During the course of the sewer work we are finding a number of manholes in yards that have been covered over by property owners. This practice is not permitted. You should be aware that when these are found they will be uncovered and/or raised to the existing grade. As a reminder, Township workers have no need to enter homes to do this work, should someone want to enter your home using the pretext of working for the Township you should notify 911 immediately.

We are finding a number of sanitary sewer problems due to the use of sanitary wipes. These products do not break down in the sewer system and they can and do cause blockages and backups in your sewer lines as well as the township main lines. Please dispose of these items in a waste can and do not flush them in the toilet. ■

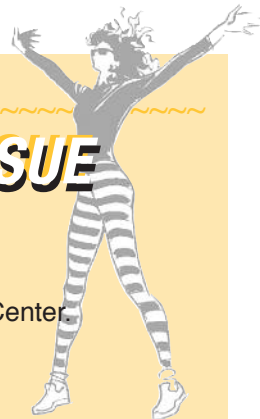
