

We hope that you have an opportunity to stop by and meet Chief Fruecht!





### A Well-Deserved Rest

# PUBLIC WORKS NOTES

## Yard Waste Dropoff

During the month of April there will be a Yard Waste drop off container behind the Public Works Garage at the Municipal Building. Residents can bring and dispose of yard waste materials as follows.

### Acceptable Items

- Garden and Plant Debris
- Leaves
- Shrubs
- Tree Limbs Diameter of 4" or less

### Non-Acceptable Items

- Grass Clippings
- Logs
- Whole Trees
- Building Materials of any Type

### Rules & Restrictions

- No Plastic Bags
- Paper Recycling Bags are OK
- Remove Dirt from Root Balls

## Grass Clipping Composting

Again this year there will be a posted area at the Township Leaf Compost Site at Linhart Park where residents can drop off grass clippings and mix with equal parts of Leaf Compost (a shovel is provided).

Leaf compost is always available to residents and is free of charge.

## Sewer Cleaning and Inspection

Although the bulk of the sewer cleaning and video inspecting is finished, Township Workers will be around doing maintenance, follow up inspections and repairs as needed. Workers do carry identification and are required to show it if asked. During the course of the sewer work we are still finding manholes in yards that have been covered over by property owners. This practice is not permitted.

You should be aware that when these are found they will be uncovered and/or raised to the existing grade. **Should someone want to enter your home using the pretext of working for the Township, you should notify 911 immediately.**

We are finding a number of sanitary sewer problems due to the use of sanitary wipes. These products do not break down in the sewer system and they can and do cause blockages and backups in your sewer lines, the township main lines as well as the wastewater treatment plant. Please dispose of these items in a waste can and do not flush in the toilet.

Please do not dump any type of fuel, pesticides, or any other contaminants into our storm sewer drains. The drains are meant for rain water only as they empty into our streams and rivers.

# Do You Know Someone on the AUTISM SPECTRUM?



**M**y name is Michelle Middlemiss and I've lived in Wilkins Township since 1990. I am a self advocate for Autism and an adult on the Autism Spectrum. Last February, my project which I named "My Safety, My Rights" was among the six chosen for a nationwide fellowship from SARTAC.(Self Advocacy Resource/ Technical Assistance Center) My project involves helping those on the Spectrum be aware of their rights and Autism awareness and training for the Police.

Last summer I worked with Sergeant Lamb of the Wilkins Twp. Police, with in-depth discussions about what Autism is; how to recognize someone on the Autism Spectrum and most importantly how they may interact with the Police. I explained to him what it is like when I hear a police siren; see lights flashing; or how I would react if confronted by someone in a uniform looking stern. The police siren seems not only deafening to us, but stirs up our senses. With some of us it may cause us to stem which involves different behaviors in all of us.

In May I asked the Police to complete surveys, asking what they knew about Autism and found that not enough was known. They welcomed training. I found that most Police respond the same way as our Police.

In October along with Brian and my friend Dan (also on the Spectrum)... we gave a three hour Autism training to the Police. The Wilkins Township Police along with the Police Secretary attended, for which I was very grateful. The new Police chief introduced himself and offered community help if needed. After a slideshow presentation we had an open forum which brought questions from the Police and they offered some great ideas. I followed up with a Post Training survey to find that their understanding of Autism had improved. This fall, I will be presenting my project and the findings at the SABE National Conference in Denver, Colorado.

- Cash donation to the state woman's club project to purchase and train service dogs for veterans


The club meets the second Tuesday of each month at 7 p.m. at the Community Center. Some of our upcoming 2020 events include:

# FIRE RESCUE NEWS

## #1 Volunteer Fire Company

### Uniquely Qualified

This past year was notable for us as we responded to 440 alarms, the most in a single year in our over 100 years of service to the community. Our volunteers invested almost 9,500 hours in company related activities, with over 3,500 of those hours specifically devoted to training. But something even more significant occurred. In Pennsylvania, the Office of the State Fire Commissioner is responsible for the establishment of firefighter training and certification standards that "identify those emergency personnel whose accomplishments in training and education meet or exceed nationally recognized standards." They offer a program of certification in specialized areas of the fire and rescue service. In Allegheny County, 43 departments participate in the program but only a few have been awarded 100 percent certification by the state. We are one of them. What makes us unique is that we are the only totally volunteer department to achieve this recognition. Truly a group of Professional Volunteers.

Our annual fund drive is under way and your past support has made it possible for us to achieve this type of recognition. It has also allowed us to purchase much needed equipment and protective gear for our volunteers. Your continued support will allow us to maintain this high level of professional response whenever you should need us. ## ALCOSAN'S Clean Water Assistance Fund

The Allegheny County Sanitary Authority has created the Clean Water Assistance Fund to help families pay their sewage treatment bills. The program is administered by Dollar Energy Fund.

The Clean Water Assistance Fund is available to ALCOSAN service area homeowners who meet family income limits set by the federal government.

The grant from ALCOSAN's Clean Water Assistance Fund is \$32 every three months. The credit will be applied to your account by Wilkinsburg Penn Joint Water Authority. The credit will automatically appear every three months, even though you are billed monthly.


### Did You Know?






